27 Call to Order

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The seventy-eighth convention of the Minnesota South District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by the President, Rev. Dr. Dean Nadasdy, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. He briefly explained the convention theme and logo.

37 President Nadasdy introduced Rev. Dr. Tom Ries, President of Concordia University, St. Paul, who

- 38 welcomed those attending the convention and reported on the status of the University. He noted that the
- 39 University is celebrating its 125th year of operation during the 2018-2019 academic year, with the theme
- 40 "Leading in Legacy." Jane Wilke was invited to share information about Concordia's activities. She
- 41 quoted CSP's mission and promise statements.

- 45 reviewed documents from 89 congregations during the past triennium, 17 of which were not
- 46 recommended for approval. There were 52 resubmissions. 12 documents are still in the review process.



- (5) Persistent adherence to false doctrine and practice

Non-rostered workers are considered at will employees in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota, and shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authorities.

4.5.16.1 Unless otherwise specified in these Bylaws, the procedure for removal of an officer of the district from office shall be as follows:

- (a) Action for removal of an officer of the district other than the district president shall require written notice to each member of the district's Board of Directors at least 30 days prior to a special meeting of the board called for that purpose. A copy of such notice shall be sent to the President and the Secretary of the Synod and to the ecclesiastical supervisor, if applicable.
- (b) The special meeting provided for herein shall be held no later than 60 days after the provision of the written notice, unless extended by the mutual agreement of the parties.
- (c) Removal from office of an officer of a district, other than a district president, shall be effected by a vote in favor of removal by at least three-fourths of all current members of the district Board of Directors (excluding the officer in question if a member of the board); and
- (d) Removal pursuant to this Bylaw may be appealed by the officer who has been removed from office through the use of

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4.5.18.2.7 **Consideration of Calls**

Pastors and commissioned ministers of subsidized congregations shall request the advice of the district president when considering the disposition of calls which have been received. Subsidized congregations shall consult the district president when a vacancy has occurred and, if calling a minister, it shall follow call process guidelines set forth by the district president. In matters pertaining to the calling of workers in subsidized ministries, the district president shall consult with the missions committee of the board of directors.
