Friday, June 8, 8:00 a.m.

CALL TO ORDER

President Lane Seitz called the convention to order in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

OPENING DEVOTION

Rev. Victor Meyr and Rev. Fred Miller, serving as chaplains for this convention, led the opening devotion. We began with the singing of "Fear Not...Go Forward." Rev. Victor Meyr read from John 4 and noted that Jesus was the weary one and the woman was the needy one. The need for earthly water is evident on hot days like this, but the refreshment is only temporary; the spiritual water of God's Word has eternal benefits. Rev. Fred Miller led the opening prayer asking God's blessing upon the convention and those present that God's Kingdom may be advanced by what is done here.

REGISTRATION AND CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Rev. James Bender, chairman of the Registration and Credentials Committee, was called forward to report. He reported that 182 voting lay delegates and 153 voting pastors were present for a total of 335 voting delegates. A quorum was declared present to conduct business.

Floor Committees will be seated on stage when they are making presentations.

All voting delegates must be seated in the proper section and have the proper identification - a gold badge.

DEVOTIONAL BIBLE STUDY - PART I

President Seitz introduced the Bible Study leader, Rev. Monte Meyer, Missionary-at-large at Minnesota State University, Mankato. "See the Fields ... Reap the Harvest," John 4:35, is the theme for the convention and was used by Rev. Monte Meyer as the thrust for the study to be divided into the following three parts:

I - Connection from Mind to Heart

II - Connection from Heart to Action

III - Connection from Action to Attitude

John 4:1-6 reminds us that there was a separation at the time of Jesus between Jews and Samaritans. However, Jesus rose above that separation as he reached out to the woman at the well to begin the conversation that brought her the spiritual water of life.

 John 4:7-15 records Jesus making the connection that the Samaritans were in need of the love of God and the blessing of eternal hope. As Jesus did, so must we see the fields and make the connection from mind to heart that these are the ones who need the good news of salvation. The fields are right where we are and we need the fuel and power of God's love to see the fields.

John 4:1-3 was explored as background information. The Pharisees were after Jesus to get Him out of their way. However, Jesus stayed at the task that was before Him and was not swayed from what He had come into the world to do. Let us debate and disagree quietly but let us praise God loudly that the world looking at us may be led to seek and adore Him.

CONSTITUTION AND MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Rev. David Winter, Chairman of the Committee, came forward to present the report of the committee. A printed copy of the report is attached to these minutes.

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APPEAL OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS DECISION REGARDING APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP BY HOPE LUTHERAN CHURCH, HASTINGS, MN

President Seitz reported the action of the MNS Board of Directors relative to the application for membership by Hope Lutheran Church of Hastings, MN.

Dr. James Pragman, Executive Assistant, read the President's report to the convention on the Board's decision to deny membership to Hope Lutheran Church.

The amendment was defeated.

While congregation income has kept pace with inflation, the amount received by the district has not. This results in a very real decrease in the amount available to carry out the work of the district. If this trend continues, reductions in work and services which the district will be able to do in the future will become necessary.





The Theme of our convention this year is: "See the Fields \dots Reap the Harvest."



It is based on the words of Jesus in John 4:35: "Do you not say, 'Four months more and then the harvest?' I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest."

Jesus spoke those words following His encounter with a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well, which was located just outside the town of Sychar. Following her conversation with Jesus, the woman left her water jar at the well and ran back to the town of Sychar, to tell the people there what had happened to her out at the well. The result was, a group of people headed out to the well to meet Jesus. The disciples, it seems, didn't see the <u>OPPORTUNITY</u> that existed that day as all of those people were heading toward them from the town of Sychar. It was in that context, then, that Jesus told his disciples, "... open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest."

The Disciples Were Distracted!

- Questioned why Jesus wouldn't eat the food they had purchased.
- Missed seeing what Jesus saw fields (people) which were ripe for harvest.

The reason the disciples didn't see the <u>OPPORTUNITY</u> that existed that day is because they were distracted!

They were talking to each other about who could have brought Jesus something to eat, since He wasn't interested in eating the food they had purchased while they were in town.

They missed seeing what Jesus saw – blood-bought people who were ripe for harvest – who were ready to be brought into the kingdom of God.

The Distractions TODAY • Status Quo • Resistance to change • Apathy • Affluence/Greed • Conflict

Like those disciples, we too can be distracted – we can lose sight of what Jesus sees today – what He wants US to see – blood-bought people who are desperately in need of hearing about the forgiveness and eternal life which come only through Him.

The distractions today can be many and subtle.

This morning, I'll mention only a few:


Status quo - being satisfied with things just the way they are

Resistance to change – refusing to look at change as a good thing, especially if it helps us to reach more people for Christ.


Apathy – not being interested or concerned about all those within our reach and around the world who will spend eternity in hell if they do not hear and believe in Christ.

Affluence/Greed – having so many material blessings today that we think we don't need God, and yet we still want more.


And last, but certainly not least, is conflict. At this point, it seems as though we have lost sight of our REAL ENEMY. Just so we're clear,







Don't be mistaken – Satan works to distract US today, just like the disciples were distracted that day outside the town of Sychar at Jacobs well.

And, when we fight with one another (conflict/infighting), which is a enormous problem for us today, to the extent that the ministry of our congregations is being effected for decades to come.

- So that we are capable of seeing the fields and reaping the harvest.

Without question, we need to repent:

Because we have sinned in allowing Satan to gain a foothold in our lives, and

We need to repent so that we are capable of seeing the fields and reaping the harvest that exists today.

Issues Which Need Attention

- Close Communion
- The Role of Women
- Worship Styles
- · Inter-Christian relationships
- · Lack of collegiality/trust
- Matthew 18

As we look to the future, we need to acknowledge that there ARE issues which need our serious attention, if we are going to continue "walking together."

They include:

Close communion

The role of women

Worship styles

Inter-Christian relationships

The lack of collegiality/trust among us

And, the failure to follow Matthew 18 as the God-pleasing approach to solving our differences.

Issues Which Need Attention

- · Fewer people in rural areas
- · Fewer pastors
 - 35-40 vacancies presently in MNS
 - 75 vacancies by 2005 (1/3 of congregations)
- · Fewer synodically-trained educators
- Weary church workers
 - Beaten down, fired, frustrated, depressed

In addition, we are going to have to address the fact that there are going to be fewer and fewer people in the rural areas of our District, which will make it difficult for many of our congregations to continue to exist.

There is also the problem of the diminishing number of pastors who will be available in the coming years to conduct a Word and Sacrament ministry to the people of our District.

In this regard, it is projected that the number of pastoral vacancies in the Minnesota South District will continue to grow, reaching possibly 75 vacancies by 2005. That would mean that $1/3^{rd}$ of our congregations would be vacant at any one point in time.

There is also a growing shortage of synodically-trained educators to serve in our congregations and schools.

And, on top of those issues, there is the fact that many of our professional church workers have grown weary in their service to the Lord and His people. They are beaten down, tired, frustrated, and depressed.

The Mission is God's Mission

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

In acknowledging those issues, however, we dare not get distracted by thinking that our mission or purpose is simply to address our internal problems.

No, our real mission is spelled out by Jesus in Matthew 28:18-20. There he says, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

The Challenge of Generations

- G1 (23,000,000) (1901-1925) (75-99)

The size of that challenge becomes obvious when we realize that for the first time in history, there are five different generations of people which we need to reach:

The GI Generation, which has 23,000,000 people (born 1901-1925) (75-99)


The Silent Generation, which has 29,000,000 people (born 1925-1942) (57-74)

The Boomer Generation, which has 65,000,000 people (born 1943-1960) (39-56)

The Buster or Gen X Generation, which has a whopping 80,000,000 people (born 1961-1981) (18-38)

The Millennial Generation, which currently has 69,000,000 people (born since 1982) (0-17)

Each of those generations have their own characteristics and present their own challenges in reaching them with the unchanging Gospel of Jesus Christ.



In the Bob Dylan song, "Blowin' in the Wind," it says, "The times they are a changin'." And they are, especially here in Minnesota.

I first realized how much they are changing about three years ago when I stopped into this restaurant in Eden Prairie for lunch one day.

All of a sudden, as I looked around the restaurant, I realized I was the only Caucasian person there. Everyone else – all of the other customers and restaurant personnel – were a different race.

Minnesota is Growing!

- 650,000 new people within the next 15 years
- 80% of them will settle in southern Minnesota

Statisticians tell us that Minnesota is going to continue to change – that 650,000 new people will move to Minnesota in the next 15 years,

and that 80% of them will move within the boundaries of the Minnesota South District.






You can get a sense of the cross-cultural challenge which is before us today simply by recognizing how many different languages are spoken in school systems around our District.

For example, 86 different languages are spoken in the Minneapolis School District.



57 different languages are spoken in the Rochester School District.



50 different languages are spoken in the Worthington School District.



And, 30 different languages are spoken in the Faribault School District.

A Threat?

They can cause an increase in welfare costs.

And, for the most part, they refuse to become "like us."

World Religions Are Coming to Minnesota

- 127,750 people practice world religions in the Twin Cities alone!*
 - 45,000 who practice Judaism (37 different synagogues)
 - 47,000 Muslims (39 different mosques)
 - 20,000 Buddhists (34 different temples).
 - 15,750 Hindus (16 different temples)

The influx of people from foreign countries also means the influx of world religions.


At the present time, for example, 127,750 people practice world religions in the Twin Cities alone! There are:

20,000 Buddhists (34 different temples)




Cults are also present within the District.

The Mormons have indicated their intentions to be serious about outreach in this area by recently building this Mormon Temple on the east side of the Twin Cities.



Chanhassen is also the world headquarters for Eckankar – a new age religion.




And, let's not underestimate the influence of Satan in a direct and powerful way.

Today, it is estimated that there are 10,000 witches and Satanists in Minnesota, which is one of the highest concentrations in the entire U.S.

There are also 379 cult/occult churches which have over 86,000 followers.

And, satanic material is readily available in bookstores like this one.



And, just to prove that what I'm talking about extends far beyond the Twin Cities, here is a Buddhist Temple in Mountain Lake, Minnesota, a town of some 1,200 people, which is located about 150 miles southwest of here.

Two Shoe Salesmen in Africa

- "Send more shoes. Nobody wears shoes here!"
- Unprecedented opportunities to share the Good News!

As I reflect on all of these statistics, I am reminded of a story which I heard a number of years ago about two shoe salesmen who were sent to Africa to sell shoes to the people there.


A week after he arrived, one salesman sent a message back to his boss which said, "Don't send any more shoes. Nobody wears shoes here!"

Several days later, the other shoe salesman also sent a message to his boss. It said, "Send more shoes. Nobody wears shoes here!"

The point is, we either see the <u>OPPORTUNITIES</u> which are before us or we don't.

I personally believe that God is giving us <u>UNPRECEDENTED OPPORTUNITIES</u> here in southern Minnesota to share the Good News of our salvation in Jesus Christ with people from all over the world.


And, we have been seizing those <u>OPPORTUNITIES</u>. For example,



There is our work among Sudanese Immigrants.

During the last decade, hundreds of people fled the Sudan in search of a new home and a new life. Many of them have settled in Anoka County. Rev. Keith Brutlag and the members of St. Matthew's, Columbia Heights have sought to reach them with the Gospel.

Other congregations have joined hands with them in trying to reach the Sudanese in their communities, congregations like: Trinity, Faribault – Bethel, St. Paul – Faith, Minneapolis – St. Stephanus, St. Paul – and St. John's, Chaska.




Over 15 years ago, we began work among the Hmong people who were emigrating to the U.S. and the Twin Cities. Rev. Steve Kosberg began that work while serving as the pastor of Mt. Zion Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. The result is, our Hmong Lutheran Church in St. Paul, which is currently being served by Deacon Chang Tao Vang, is one of the largest Hmong congregations in the U.S. today.


Today, the opportunities to reach the Hmong people are even greater than they were 15 years ago. Today, for example, were told that 25% of the children in the St. Paul School District are Hmong.

Our newest effort to reach the Hmong is Grace Hmong Lutheran Church in Minneapolis.

And, St. Stephanus, St. Paul and Bethlehem, St. Paul are also discovering that the fields indeed are ripe for harvest among the Hmong people.




One of the newest OPPORTUNITIES we are seizing is the opportunity to reach Southeast Asian people in outstate Minnesota. We have partnered with the members of Trinity, Mountain Lake to provide for a vicar, Mr. Don Arehart, who will be responsible for working with the pastor of the congregation, Rev. Bob Gardner, and the members, to try to reach these people for Jesus Christ.



There are also some 10,000 African Immigrants in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area alone.

Several years ago, a student from Concordia, St. Paul, Mr. Kennedy Gee, formed a congregation – Grace International Lutheran Church – in hopes of reaching some of these African Immigrants.


Today, others have joined Kennedy in reaching out with the news of forgiveness in Jesus Christ to these African Immigrants – congregations like: Grace, Brooklyn, Park – Eastern Heights, St. Paul – and Bethel, St. Paul.



For over 20 years, our District has been involved in outreach to Hispanics in the St. Paul area through the work of Rev. Larry Miller and the members of Christo el Redentor Lutheran Church. In recent years, however, there has been an influx of Hispanics who have settled in many of the small towns in southern Minnesota. We are aggressively seeking to share the Gospel with them.

Rev. Martin Teigen serves as our Missionary to Hispanics in southern Minnesota.

Through his efforts, congregations like Salem, Madelia – Immanuel, Gaylord – First, Glencoe – and St. Paul, Waseca are now involved in outreach to Hispanics.



The campuses of the colleges and universities in southern Minnesota are also a ripe harvest field today.

Today, there are 13,000 students from foreign countries studying on the campuses of our colleges and universities. What an opportunity we have to share the Gospel with these students, who will hopefully carry that Good News back to their homeland and to their own people.

Today, we are seeking to share the Gospel with these international students on the campuses of:

Minnesota State University in Mankato
The University of Minnesota in Minneapolis
Southwest State University in Marshall
Winona State University in Winona, and
Ridgewater Community College in Hutchinson




The Philips Neighborhood in Minneapolis is one of the most poverty-stricken communities in the state of Minnesota. The Philips Neighborhood also has one of the highest crimes rates in all of Minnesota. Over 55% of the people who live there are people from other countries – Somalia, Liberia, Ghana, Laos, Viet Nam, Cambodia, Mexico and several South American countries.

The Philips Neighborhood is where Trinity First Lutheran Church and School are located.

Under the leadership of Rev. Del Wippich, the congregation is attempting to maintain its Gospel presence in one of the toughest places to do ministry in Minnesota today.

This picture of some of the students at Trinity First Lutheran School gives you a glimpse of some of the cross cultural challenges facing one of the oldest congregations in Minnesota today.



One of our most unique attempts to reach people for Jesus Christ is through the ministry of Mr. Tom Gundermann. Tom, working out of Trinity First in Minneapolis, serves as a street evangelist in the Philips Neighborhood. He is a man who has a passion second to none in reaching the people of the Philips Neighborhood, especially the children, with the news of Jesus Christ.

His mission field includes one of the largest Native American populations and housing complexes in the United States, drug dealers, prostitutes, and liquor stores which do millions upon millions of dollars of business a year , people of all nationalities , and blocks of substandard housing. What's so surprising about Tom is that even in the midst of such challenging circumstances, you will always find him with a smile on his face. It is obvious that he loves the opportunity that the Lord is giving Him to tell people about Jesus Christ and how He makes a lasting difference in people's lives.

Our Response to the Ripe Harvest

- The unchurched in rural areas
 One out of every three people Minnesota is unchurched
- Rural congregations are making it possible to carry on Christ's mission here and throughout the world through their generous mission offerings

In talking about our response to the ripe harvest which exists in the Minnesota South District today, we dare not forget the faithful efforts of congregations all across our District, especially in rural areas, to reach the unchurched. Today, one out of every three people in Minnesota is unchurched. So, no matter where we live, there are people who need to hear the Gospel and get connected to a congregation.

One of the real strengths of our District has been the commitment of our rural congregations to support our mission efforts with their financial gifts. They have made it possible for us to respond to the call of Christ in areas which are booming with new people. Without their financial support, we would not be able to reap the harvest that exists today.

The NEED!

 Men, women, and children who have a passion to reach the lost and unchurched!

"When he [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said, to his disciples, The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest fields," (Matthew 9.37-38)

Once again, God is giving us incredible opportunities to share the Gospel with people from all over the world, without ever leaving southern Minnesota.

What we really need today are men, women and children who have a passion to reach the lost and the unchurched!

As I reflect on what I see happening in southern Minnesota today, I can't help but think of what we're told in Matthew 9:37-38. There it says, "When [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said, to his disciples, The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest fields."

The Model of the Early Church

 Peter as he stood before the Sanhedrin after he healed a beggar — "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved." (Acts 4:12)

The members of the Early Church took up that challenge.

They seized the opportunities that the Lord gave them, always striving to be faithful to the mission which was given to them, even in difficult circumstances, like Peter as he stood before the Sanhedrin after he healed a beggar. In a situation where the temptation might have been to give in, Peter stated boldly, "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved."

The Reaction

• "When they saw the <u>courage</u> of Peter and John and realized that they were <u>unschooled, ordinary</u> men, they were <u>astonished</u> and they <u>took note</u> that these men had been with Jesus." (Acts 4:13)

In Acts 4:13, we're told what the reaction was to Peter's confession. There it states, "When they saw the <u>courage</u> of Peter and John and realized that they were <u>unschooled</u>, <u>ordinary</u> men, they were <u>astonished</u> and they <u>took note</u> that these men had been with Jesus."

The point is, when we share the Word, people take note of what we say. Through our witness, the Holy Spirit, can reap the harvest that exists right here in southern Minnesota today. The joy is that we can be partners with Him in that wonderful work.

Revelation 7

"After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb." (Revelation 7:9)

In Revelation 7, the Apostle John had a vision one day of what you and I will someday be privileged to see. There John states, "After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb."

The Bottom Line

Some day, by the grace of God, you and I will be standing in that crowd – before the throne – in front of the Lamb – wearing robes made white in the blood of the Lamb. And as a result of the Holy Spirit working through our sometimes feeble efforts many of those in the multitude standing before the throne of the Lamb will be from the Minnesota South District!!!

The bottom line, then, is that some day, by the grace of God, you and I will be standing in that crowd — before the throne — in front of the Lamb — wearing robes made white in the blood of the Lamb. And, as a result of the Holy Spirit working through our sometimes feeble efforts, many of those in the multitude standing before the throne of the Lamb will be from the Minnesota South District!

Convention Greetings

Rev. Dr. O. H. Cloeter, President Emeritus June 9, 2000

"Grace, mercy, and peace be yours in Christ, our risen and ascended Lord.

"My dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

"First of all, thank you for the honor of conferring on me the title of President Emeritus. I don't know what this means. I'm sure it doesn't pay anything. Still it serves to tickle the ego. So, thank you.

"Permit me also to extend my sincere congratulations and best wishes to you, President Seitz, upon your re-election. I pray that God may continue to bless you, not only with health and strength, but also with the wisdom and understanding necessary to carry out the difficult duties of your office.

"It seems to me that, for a variety of reasons, the work of a District President is becoming more difficult all the time. I hope you won't take it amiss if I speak from the heart about something that really concerns me.

"Sitting on the sidelines, just watching and listening these past nine years, I have come to the conclusion that there is a reason to be concerned about the future of our church body. It is troubling to see the extremes which are pulling us in opposite directions, while those who represent the extremes hardly talk with one another. In fact, instead of talking, a barrage of cannon shots are fired. Bitter invectives are hurled from one side to the other.

"On the one hand, there are those who seem to have little regard for our confessional position. They are willing to fellowship with almost anyone; their Communion practice is wide open; they are pushing for the ordination of women; and some are already practicing selective fellowship with those who are of a different confession. And more things could be mentioned.

"And then there is the other side represented by those who have adopted a rather sacerdotal or hierarchical view of the Holy Ministry. They insist that in preaching the Word and administering the Sacraments they are Christ (not that they represent Christ, but that they are Christ), and who therefore tend to be very rigid in their practice. They insist that there is only one way to worship and that only those hymns that are in a synodically approved hymnal may be used. Some of them even insist that it is wrong to use girls for acolytes and women for ushers. More examples could be listed of things that would bind us to the shackles of human tradition and authority.

"My heart aches when I think of where all this is leading us. Do you realize what is happening? There are pastors and congregations who want no part of either extreme and who finally reach the point where they say, 'A plague on both your houses.' We see it happening already that pastors and congregations lose all interest in synodical matters, they withdraw from synodical meetings, they send their mission money to other agencies, and they decide to go their own way. How can we as a synodical entity long endure when these two extremes threaten to tear us apart? The Lord never promised that the gates of hell would not prevail against The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. That is a promise given only to the Holy Christian and Apostolic Church. With due respect to Barry Goldwater, I shall amend his quip of some thirty years ago: I shall invert it and say, 'Extremism in theology is never a virtue.'

"Brothers and sisters, all this <u>need not</u> be so, and I pray that all of us will determine that it <u>shall not</u> be so. Yes, through the power of the Word and by the grace of God we can be of one heart and speak with one voice. With the help of God we can be what we have always claimed to be, a truly evangelical, Gospel-centered church where the truth of the Word prevails (yes, let's never give an inch where God's Word has clearly spoken), but at the same time a church in which love, God's kind of love, prevails in all its fullness and gentleness and sweetness.

"I love The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. She is my spiritual mother. Lord, don't let her go astray in any direction. Keep her in your way, the strait and narrow way. Let the prayer of St. Paul be our prayer: 'May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you a spirit of unity among yourselves as you follow Christ Jesus, so that with one heart and mouth you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ' (Romans 15:5).

"Now to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is at work within us, to Him be glory in the Church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever! Amen' (Ephesians 3:20-21).
